In addition, I will provide some primary source documents that will require your analysis in the form of a paper.

Course Description

This course is a survey of the social, political, economic, cultural, religious and intellectual history of Europe and the Mediterranean world from the earliest civilizations to the Middle Ages. Topics include the civilizations of Mesopotamia, ancient Egypt, Persia, Greece and Rome and early European civilization. It is a lecture discussion, reading, research and writing course with the expectation that students will participate in the education with many opportunities to engage the professor and each other in classroom discussions.

Statement of Purpose

This course partially satisfies the requirements for the state of Texas core curriculum requirements, and the requirements for the Associate Degree at Clarendon College.

Methods of Instruction

This course centers upon lecture, discussion, critical analysis of primary sources, and in-class work. Discussion is important for learning concepts and a better understanding of the course content. Therefore, regular assessments will be utilized to help students keep up with the material. The learning environment in the classroom is based on students reading and learning material outside of class. Historical documents, videos, and PowerPoint presentations will be utilized as part of the instructional process.

Core Objectives

In accordance with recommendations from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, all American History courses at Clarendon College will address the following core objectives:

- Critical Thinking Skills - to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information
- Communication Skills - to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication
- Personal Responsibility - to include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making
- Social Responsibility: to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global issues

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

1. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
 - a. Assesses CT, COM, PR, and SR with a historical opinion paper.
2. Analyze and interpret primary sources.
 - a. Assesses CT with document analysis of sources used for paper.
3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on this period of United States history.
 - a. Assess PR through quizzes and major exams.

Attendance

Attendance is taken at the beginning of each class. Class attendance and participation is expected. Poor attendance does not affect your grade, but good attendance can help improve your grade. Good attendance is three or less unexcused absences. An excused absence must be validated by a doctor's note, word from either a Coach or the Academic Dean, or instances of extreme emergency as determined by the instructor. All other absences will be unexcused. It is vital to student success for each student to be involved in the learning process by attending class. Three or less absences mean you will be bumped up to the next grade level if your points are in the 8-9 % range (a 68 = 70; 78 = 80, etc). Four or more unexcused absences simply results in receiving the grade you earn. **If you have an excused absence and you want to still catch the class, you can zoom the class at 806-874-4816.**

Switching from F2F to Online

It is the policy of the Liberal Arts Division at Clarendon College that any student enrolled in a face-to-face Liberal Arts course must remain in the scheduled face-to-face course through the end of the semester unless the student chooses to drop the course. No student may choose to transition from face-to-face to remote or online. Extenuating circumstances that warrant a transition to online learning can override this policy if determined by the Vice President of Academic Affairs in consultation with the Division Chair and the course instructor. This transition will be communicated in writing to all parties: student, instructor, Division Chair, and Vice President of Academic Affairs.

If you want to make this switch you must do it by the Friday of the first week of school (8/30/2024).

Grade

The grade for this course will be earned through performance on quizzes, exams, and writing a term paper. There will be a quiz every Tuesday. These will happen at the beginning of each class period. Only **excused** absences on Tuesdays will receive a make-up quiz. There will be an exam after each unit. You will have some extra credit opportunities throughout the semester.

Exams and Quizzes

Each exam will consist of thirty-three multiple choice items. It will be taken during class in the Success Center. Exams are given online. Quizzes will be given each week at the beginning of class every Tuesday. You will have approximately 5 minutes to take it. There should be a total of 14 quizzes this semester. Each quiz is worth ten points. The last few quizzes are extra credit. ***Special Incentive: Each student who scores a raw exam score of 90% are better will receive a \$25.00 VISA Gift Card.***

Make-Up and Paper Deadlines

Missed Exam I and Exam II can be made up. It is up to the student to schedule the make-up exam. Make up exams must be completed by December 2. **There will be no make-up for Exam III.** Missed deadline for the term paper will be penalized by a grade letter. Exams and Paper parts will receive a 0 after December 6

Withdrawal:

If you decide that you are unable to complete this course or that it will be impossible to complete the course with a passing grade, you may drop the course and receive a "W" instead of a grade. Withdrawal from a course is a formal procedure that the student must initiate. If you do not go through the withdrawal procedure, you will receive whatever grade you earn on your transcript. Keep in mind that students are only allowed to drop the same course twice before he or she will be charged triple tuition for taking the class a third time or more. Furthermore, students in Texas may only drop a total of six courses throughout their entire undergraduate career. No drops allowed after 6 dropped courses no matter where you attend college in Texas.
