Course Description: This course is an introduction to medical terminology with emphasis on recognition, defining, pronunciation, and spelling of medical terms. The student will also learn how to use a medical dictionary.

Statement of Purpose: Medical Terminology partially satisfies the requirements for the Associates Degree at Clarendon College and is designed for transfer to a senior college.

Required Texts: *Ehrlich/Schroeder - Bundle: Medical Terminology for Health Professions, 8th + MindTap® Medical Terminology, 2 term (12 months) Printed Access Card - 9781337123099* Class lectures will be based on the book chapters, but not all of the material in the text will be covered in class. **You are, nevertheless, responsible for reading the Text.** Further, supplemental material may be presented that is not in the book, and thus it is essential that you attend the class regularly.

Online Course website: This online course uses Moodle as its online course management program. All instructions, tutorials, exams, and assignments are provided at the course website. All assignments will be submitted there. Due dates for all assignments are listed in the “Course Schedule” at the course website. Most communication between you and your instructor and fellow classmates will be handled in Moodle through the “Messages” feature and discussion forums. You will be able to log into the course website once you have officially registered for the course and once you have been added to the course website. The course website will become available to you by the first day of the semester. If you register late, you will generally have access to the course within 24 hours after you register. In order to be successful in completing HITT1305, a 3-credit hour course, you should plan to spend around 4 hours per day on the course.

- Provide the student with a fundamental understanding of the structure and root meanings of medical language.
- Promote confidence in using a technical vocabulary.
- Provide the student with an appreciation of the human body and the myriad of unknown aspects of “the amazing machine” still to be learned.

Grading Policies: Your letter grade for HITT 1305 comes from three components: class participation, lecture exams, and Quizzes/Assignments.

Course participation will count as 10% of your final course grade. This grade comes from your participation in discussion and pronunciation exercises.

Four Exams (including the final) are worth 50% of your final grade. Each test will be weighted equally. Each test covers the material covered since the last test (not comprehensive). The tests will utilize a variety of question formats (objective, matching, multiple choice, true/false, etc.) I will drop your lowest lecture test grade, excluding the final which must be counted.

Weekly homework exercises and quizzes are worth 20% of your final course grade. Each exercise will be over your weekly reading assignments. These quizzes will be available as long as the specific chapter is open to you. Failure to complete an exercise or quiz will result in a zero for that assignment. I will drop your lowest quiz grade at the end of the semester.

Trifold education pamphlet worth 20% of your final course grade. The Pamphlet will be on a topic I assign you. You may use the text and any resources available to you. This project will demonstrate your understanding of the terminology and its role in communicating with individuals throughout healthcare.

Academic Integrity: An Excerpt from Clarendon College's Student Handbook

Failure to comply with lawful direction of a classroom instructor is a disruption for all students enrolled in the class. Plagiarism is the using, stating, offering, or reporting as one's own, an idea, expression, or production of another person without proper credit.

Disciplinary actions for cheating in a course are at the discretion of the individual instructor. The instructor of that course will file a report with the Executive Vice President of Academics and Student Affairs when a student is caught cheating in the course, whether it be a workforce or academic course. The report shall include the course, instructor, student's name, and the type of cheating involved. 1. Whether to drop a class or not requires a lot of thought. According to Texas state law a student is only allowed to drop the same class twice before he/she will be charged triple the

tuition amount for taking the class a third time or more. Furthermore, beginning with the Fall 2007 semester, students in Texas may only drop a total of 6 courses throughout their entire undergraduate career. After the 6th dropped class, he/she will no longer be able to withdraw from any classes. infraction through the remainder of the course. Furthermore, that student will not be allowed to drop their lowest quiz grade or exam grade. A second act of dishonesty will result in an F for the course. Note that dishonest behavior includes both the act of copying someone else's work as well as allowing someone to copy your work. Both students are equally guilty and will be equally punished.
